Section C2 - Summary (10 marks)

For full marks, good writing and organisation (2+2 marks) **and** the summary **should** include at least 3 of these points

- half of a double portrait with Hayman himself
- cut in half when marriage broke down
- lost track of it
- appeared in USA
- bought by Mr Mould
- cleaned – over-painting removed
- discovered Hayman’s legs
- matched and reunited with Hayman’s self-portrait

Sample/Model Answer:

Hayman’s portrait of his wife was originally half of a painting showing Hayman and his wife together. However, when their marriage broke down, Hayman cut the painting in two and painted over his legs. It next appeared in the USA, where it was bought by a British collector, Mr Mould, who, when having the later painting removed, discovered Hayman’s legs underneath. Mould then matched and reunited it with Hayman’s self-portrait.
